



# Docklands, Melbourne

A waterfront area along the banks of the Yarra River, Docklands is a sought-after business district with the big names like the National Austria Bank, ANZ, Medibank and Ericsson on one bank, with luxurious modern villas on the other. All buildings are modern and each one is unconventional, transforming the area into a spectacular experience for daily office-goers as well as tourists. On the other side of the river are outstanding luxurious villas making it a vibrant destination for the well-heeled. The villas offer a beautiful view of the river and there is a range of cafes, restaurants and parks for people to hang out. Docklands is one of the most modern ongoing urban renewal projects and is one of the landmark destinations of Melbourne.



## Little Venice, London

Apart from the most desirable properties this neighbourhood has to offer, it also has a Little Venice in a tranquil canal at the far end. It is lined with waterside cafes and pubs and is the perfect place to enjoy a summer afternoon watching boats go by. Little Venice is also known for its theatre scene where you can see anything from puppet shows to plays to free live performances at the amphitheater. You can take a canal boat ride from Little Venice to Camden Town, another electrifying place to visit.



# **University of Melbourne**

The oldest university in Victoria, its primary campus in Parkville has been extended with a delightful mix of period buildings and modern structures. The Bailieu Library building is a modern building with spacious library areas inside. The underground South Lawn car park is one of the university's most distinguished features, designed using the most innovative structural systems. The design comprises a series of reinforced concrete shells with parabolic profiles supported on short columns. The columns encase pipes to drain the soils above for the planting of lawn and trees of the South Lawn. Excavations involved substantial earthworks to retain the lawn at the same level of the 'Old Quad' building, the historic core of the university. The east entrance to the car park incorporates a door from a 1745 house in St Stephen's Green, Dublin, and the west entrance is constructed with the salvaged doorway and is framed by two Atlas figures from the demolished Colonial Bank, Elizabeth Street.

# Grindelwald, Switzerland

Grindelwald is a small place, restricted to mainly one street. This small village consists of numerous chalets, most of which are hotels, along with souvenir shops and supermarkets. Grindelwald has an intriguing view of the various snow-capped mountains which overlap each other, including the famous Jungfraujoch, which is the highest peak of Europe. At one end of the main street lies the Grindelwald Railway Station with four platforms, which merges seamlessly with the main street outside. As I visited Grindelwald in mid-May, I was fortunate to witness the locals conduct a Bell Parade, in which the officials wear their uniforms and march with huge Swiss bells to create a mellifluous atmosphere while others carry the town's Mayor on a chair as a mark of respect.



# Interlaken, Switzerland

The fascinating city of Interlaken is nestled in the eastern part of Switzerland and is one of the most unique cities in the world. On the West of Interlaken is Lake Thun, with Lake Brienz to its East. To the North, lies Harder Kulm, the highest peak of Interlaken and Grindelwald First Mountain to the . The urbanized city of Interlaken is well-planned with vast green spaces and a combination of period and modern architecture.



## South Bank, London

One Sunday, I wandered off to South Bank to meet a cousin. It is right by the Thames, near the London Eye, in the heart of the city. What I didn't realize was that South Bank is a cultural hub, a home to art centers and performances. As a backdrop to all the open-air pubs and themed bars serving cocktails and finger food, stood the iconic modern architecture of South Bank Centre overlooking the Thames.
